Senator Jeff Stone

California's 28th District

Biography

Senator Jeff Stone was elected to represent the 28th State Senate District in 2014. The 28th District stretches from Southwest Riverside County (Temecula, Murrieta and Lake Elsinore) all the way to the Arizona Border.

Senator Stone has lived in Southern California his entire life. He moved to Temecula because of the rural lifestyle and family values it represents. Senator Stone knew Temecula was one of the best places to open a business and raise a family.

In 1983, he opened his first small business the "Temecula Pharmacy" and began building his strong ties and local involvement within the community. In 1992, he began expanding his public service involvement when he ran and was elected to the Temecula City Council, serving for three terms. As Mayor, he authored the REST (Revenue Excess Sharing in Temecula) Program that lowered the one special tax that citizens of Temecula paid for – resulting in returning millions of dollars and proving government could be run more efficiently.

Senator Stone served as Mayor of Temecula until being elected to the Riverside County Board of Supervisors. Senator Stone's election to the Board of Supervisors in 2004 was an illustration of how effective his term on the City Council had been. Senator Stone successfully beat an incumbent and was re-elected to the Board of Supervisors in 2008 and 2012. Prior to being elected and sworn into the State Senate, he served as Chairman of the Board of Supervisors.

Among his accomplishments on the Board of Supervisors was the developing of the SCRAPE (Save County of Riverside Against Preventable Expenditures program) that eliminated many wasteful programs and saved Riverside County hundreds of millions of dollars. He also authored the VALOR (Veteran's Assistance Leadership of Riverside County) program that provided shelter and support services to every willing homeless veteran in Riverside County. He also authored the Wine Country 20/20 Plan which preserved and expanded the Temecula Wine Country that when fully built out, will provide thousands of new jobs and economic opportunities for Riverside County.

One of Senator Stone's proudest accomplishments came several years ago when he advocated creating a second tier for new hires and raising the employee portion of the pension contribution, saving taxpayers millions while maintaining vital County services over the long term.

Public safety is a top priority of his, and he looks forward to continuing the work he did as a County Supervisor, where he created the County's emergency reserve fund, streamlined the County's property assessment system to help financially distressed families keep their homes, created the County's internet juvenile sexual predator interdiction program, passed a County resolution making it easier for law abiding citizens to carry concealed firearms for personal protection, and cut transportation mitigation fees by half to promote economic growth.

As a State Senator, he embraces the philosophy of a fiscally responsible and more efficient government that is less intrusive and more productive for its citizens. Senator Stone championed many efforts to stop over \$30 billion in new taxes on the citizens of California.

Senator Stone has also refused to accept political contributions from big tobacco and coauthored many new laws to make it tougher for juveniles to buy tobacco products and start smoking. He also has taken on Global issues including authoring a Senate resolution which passed to urge Congress to **oppose the Iran Deal** that would put Israel and the United States in harm's way. He also has been a strong critic of freeing up \$150 billion in sanction money and opposes giving Iran the green light to continue their rogue nuclear enrichment programs.

Senator Stone also has had important bills signed into law including the new prescription drug take back law which goes into effect January 1, 2016 which allows anyone to go into a participating pharmacy and at no charge to them, drop their unused pharmaceuticals in a specially designed storage container, and, he wrote a new law to help with the restoration of the Salton Sea.

In addition to his work in government, Senator Stone continues to own and operate his local business, Innovative Compounding Pharmacy. Senator Stone is a graduate of USC, where he earned a Doctor of Pharmacy degree. He has taught graduate nursing students seeking their masters in nursing degrees at Cal State Dominguez Hills as an assistant professor of pharmacology and also served as an externship professor for the USC School of Pharmacy.

Ray Culberson is the Director of Youth Services for San Bernardino Unified School District, the 6th largest district in the state of California. He holds an MBA in Marketing, an MA in Political Science, an MA in Educational Administration, a Single--Subject teaching credential, and an Administrative Credential in education. He also holds a BA in Political Science and a BA in Rhetoric (persuasive communication) from the University of California, Berkeley. Ray has the unique ability to utilize humor, dramatic sketches, philosophical concepts, direct street knowledge, management theories and business philosophies, integrating them into a solid presentation that ensures each participant leaves with a clear understanding of the concepts presented.

Duties of Elected Officers

SCSNA By Laws, Article V. Government:

Section 3. Duties of the Officers

1. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the Southern California School Nutrition Association; shall preside at meetings of the Executive Board; exercise general supervisory control over the management of the Association; perform all other duties usually associated with the office of the President; i. e. appoint and be a member ex-officio of all standing and special committees; appoint a qualified member to fill unexpired terms of any and all vacancies in special and standing committees within the Southern California School Nutrition Association.

2. President-Elect shall perform the duties and functions of the President whenever necessary in the absence of the President. The President-Elect shall be acquainted with all duties and functions of the president and other officers and with the activities of the California Association. The President-Elect shall automatically serve as President for one year following term as President-Elect. The President-Elect shall be a member of the Finance & Budget Committee, and be responsible for planning programs of interest to the membership. May be a member of the fundraiser committee.

3. The Recording Secretary shall attend all general meetings and all meetings of the Executive Board and shall act as clerk thereof and record all notes and minutes of proceedings in a book to be kept for this purpose; shall send copies of minutes of each meeting to the elected officers of the Southern California School Nutrition Association and members of the Executive Board and to the general membership if requested by the President; shall prepare reports.

4. Corresponding Secretary shall conduct general correspondence of the Southern California School Nutrition Association and may handle the registration for the Fundraisers and serve as Registration chair on the Fundraiser committee.

5. Treasurer shall receive and have custody of all funds of the Southern California School Nutrition Association and deposit same in the name and to the credit of the Association in such depositories as may be designated by the Executive Board; shall sign all checks with the President; shall keep full and accurate accounts of the receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the Southern California School Nutrition Association and submit such books for review annually. Report from review shall be submitted at the meeting of the incoming and outgoing officers. Treasurer shall submit a report at each Executive Board business meeting of the Southern California School Nutrition Association and shall serve as Chair of the Finance & Budget Committee.

6. The President shall serve as delegate to the CSNA House of Delegates. If a second delegate is allowed, that representative shall be the President-Elect; a third delegate shall be the Recording Secretary. Additional delegates and alternates shall be chosen from the elected officers in the order in which they are listed in Article V, Section 2 of this Constitution.

7. The Immediate Past President shall serve as a voting member of the Executive Committee.

SCSNA Chapter 1 PP&L Update November 6, 2017

Bills Signed by Governor Brown

SB 250 (Hertzberg) – Lunch Shaming

This bill requires a local educational agency with a school that is required to serve a free or reduced-price meal during the school day, that is not eligible for a universal meal service plan, to develop a plan that ensures that any student whose parent or guardian has unpaid school meal fees is not shamed or treated differently, or delayed or denied a nutritiously adequate meal, regardless of whether the student is eligible for free or reduced-price meals. SB 250 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 726, Statutes of 2017.

- SB 250 takes effect on January 1, 2018.
- ➤ CSNA is working closely with the California Department of Education on the interpretation of the language and on forthcoming guidance.

SB 138 (McGuire) – Universal Free Breakfast and Lunch

This bill requires very high poverty schools, as defined, to operate a universal meal service, and to begin providing free universal free breakfast and lunch through the universal meal service. The bill would also authorize a local education agency to stop providing the universal free meal service if a school ceases to be a very high poverty school. SB 138 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 724, Statutes of 2017.

> SB 138 takes effect January 1, 2018.

SB 557 (Hernandez) – Share Tables

Current law authorizes a container of food that is not potentially hazardous to be transferred from one consumer to another if the food is dispensed so that it is protected from contamination and the container is closed between uses or if the food is in an unopened original package and is maintained in sound condition, and if the food is checked periodically on a regular basis. This bill would exempt from this prohibition, food that a school cafeteria donates to a food bank or to any other nonprofit charitable organization for distribution to persons free of charge that fits specified criteria. SB 557 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 285, Statutes of 2017

AB 1219 (Eggman) – Donated Foods

This bill expands existing provisions of the California Civil Code, Food and Agricultural Code, and Health and Safety Code, relating to civil immunities and liabilities of entities that donate food fit for human consumption, to charitable organizations and food banks. AB 1219 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 619, Statutes of 2017.

> AB 1219 takes effect January 1, 2018.

AB 1502 (Thurmond) – Student Data Match for Eligibility

This bill requires CDE to conduct the data match of local school records to determine program eligibility for the National School Lunch Program and the School Breakfast Program, as required by federal law. AB 1502 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 91, Statutes of 2017.

> AB 1502 takes effect January 1, 2018.

SB 544 (McGuire) – Procurement

This bill requires procurement bid solicitations and awards made by a school district for purchases in support of federal nonprofit child nutrition programs to be consistent with certain federal procurement standards. The bill requires awards to go to the most responsive and responsible party, and requires price to be the primary consideration, but not the only determining factor. SB 544 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 395, Statutes of 2017.

> SB 544 takes effect on January 1, 2018.

SB 730 (Pan) – Buy American

This bill requires CDE to monitor compliance and enforce the Buy American provision of the National School Lunch Program for school food authorities. SB 730 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 571, Statutes of 2017. ➤ SB 730 takes effect January 1, 2018.

AB 822 (Caballero) – Purchasing State Grown

Under current law, price, fitness and quality being equal, any body, officer, or other person charged with the purchase, or permitted or authorized to purchase supplies for the use of the state, or of any of its institutions or offices, or for the use of any county or city, is required to always prefer supplies, defined to include produce, that are grown, manufactured, or produced in the state, and is required to next prefer supplies partially manufactured, grown, or produced in the state. AB 822 was approved by the Governor and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 785, Statutes of 2017.

> AB 822 takes effect on January 1, 2018.

AB 691 (Levine) – Almond Milk

This bill authorizes almond milk as one of the types of milk that complies with state and federal laws on nutritional content of school meal programs and competitive foods in schools. AB 691 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 382, Statutes of 2017.

> AB 691 takes effect January 1, 2018.

AB 841 (Weber) – Advertising Non-Compliant Food and Beverages

This bill prohibits public schools from advertising food or beverages which do not meet specified nutritional standards on school campuses during the school day, and from participating in corporate student incentive programs involving non-compliant food and beverages. AB 841 was approved by the Governor and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 843, Statutes of 2017.

> AB 841 takes effect on January 1, 2018.

AB 46 (Cooper) – Equal Pay

Under current law, an employer is prohibited from paying an employee at a lesser rate because of gender or race. An employee paid less in violation of these provisions is authorized to file a complaint with the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement. This bill defines "employer" to include public and private employers. AB 46 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 776, Statutes of 2017.

> AB 46 takes effect January 1, 2018.

SB 63 (Jackson) – Parental Paid Leave

This bill enacts a new parental leave policy that grants small business employees the right to take up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave to bond with a new child and requires employers to pay for continued group health coverage during the duration of the employee's parental leave. SB 63 has been approved by Governor Brown and chaptered by the Secretary of State, Chapter 686, Statutes of 2017.

> SB 63 takes effect January 1, 2018.

FAME honors school nutrition's brightest

Lauren Teng from Huntington Beach Union School District in California takes top prize.

The 29th annual Foodservice Achievement Management Excellence (FAME) Awards winners have been announced, with Lauren Teng, administrator of food and nutrition service for Huntington Beach Union School District in California, receiving the Golden Director of the Year Award.

In her 34 years as director, Teng has taken many steps to modernize the program, particularly in the face of declining enrollment. She has done this by changing the way food has traditionally been served to students. For instance, she convinced district administration to move the lunch period to midday from later in the day and introduced mobile carts to reach areas where students congregate. Teng also opened the first on-campus coffee house and increased fresh produce consumption by 150 percent by promoting classroom nutrition, and partnered with school and culinary classes to ensure nutrition was a part of the core school curriculum.

Teng also secured a \$175,000 grant to modernize equipment, including the purchase of a food truck.

The winners will be honored at the School Nutrition Association's School Nutrition Industry Conference in January in New Orleans. The program is sponsored by Basic American Foods, Schwan's Food Service Inc. and Tyson Foods.
