



Community Eligibility Provision and Direct Certification

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CEP Basics

- New provision available in SY 2014–15
- 4-year reimbursement option for eligible high-poverty LEAs and schools
- Individual schools, group(s) of schools, or entire LEAs may apply
- Schools must serve breakfast & lunch at no cost to all students



CEP Benefits

- Never collect meal applications
- Never perform Verification activities
- Increased revenue and guaranteed reimbursement percentages
- Overt identification and unpaid meal fees are eliminated
- All students receive two meals a day



CEP Qualifications

LEAs or schools must:

- ISP of at least 40 percent, based on prior April 1 SY enrollment
- Cannot round up to reach the 40 percent
- Agree to serve breakfast and lunch at no cost to students
- History of following the NSLP or SBP program regulations



CEP Reimbursement

- Reimbursement based on the ISP, and calculated by the USDA Multiplier
- ISP multiplied by the Multiplier equals the percentage of meals claimed at the free rate
- Claim the remaining percentage of meals at the paid rate



Additional Information

- ISP will never decrease once established in first year
- LEAs may apply to use the higher ISP in the following school year
- LEAs or schools cover the cost difference between serving meals at no charge to all students and reimbursement rates



Household Income Data Collection Form

- Schools participating in the CEP must collect the individual socioeconomic status of each student for LCFF purposes
- Sample household income data collection forms are available to use in calculating the school's LCFF and eligibility for other non-nutrition programs



Household Income Data Collection Form (continued)

- Costs associated with income forms cannot be paid for with cafeteria funds
- No reference can be made to nutrition programs on the income form

Direct Certification

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Direct Certification

What is Direct Certification (DC)?

- The process in which all program operators must use to certify children receiving certain types of public assistance for free meals without further application
- Mandatory
- Must be completed a minimum of three times per school year



Direct Certification

Programs that can directly certify students for free meals:

- SNAP (CalFresh)
- TANF (CalWORKs)
- Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR)
- Homeless, Migrant, Runaway
- Foster
- Head Start
- Medicaid (Medi-Cal) (coming SY 2017–18)

Direct Certification – Advantages

- Ensures that most needy children are provided free meals
- Fewer meal applications to process
- Fewer applications to verify





Direct Certification Through CALPADS

Program operators of school districts, county offices of education, and public charter schools can directly certify students through CALPADS

- CALPADS contains CalFresh, CalWORKs, and foster student eligibility
- CALPADS information is updated monthly



Direct Certification Through Local Information

All program operators can obtain info from local county health and social services offices to directly certify students

- Information required to directly certify students includes: name, another identifier such as birthdate, benefit type, certification from official, and certification date
- Establish an MOU to share data with the county offices
- DC costs associated with obtaining local lists can be paid with cafeteria fund



Direct Certification Through Local Information

Local CalFresh agencies are **required** to provide CalFresh and CalWORKs info to program sponsors to assist with DC

Direct Certification Through Local Information

All program operators can use lists from homeless and migrant liaisons to directly certify students

Direct Certification – Categorical Eligibility

There are two types of eligibility based on the type of public assistance benefits a student or household receives

- Categorical eligibility through CalFresh, CalWORKS, or FDPIR
- Eligibility extends to other school age children in the household





Direct Certification – Other Source Categorical Eligibility

Other source eligibility through homeless, foster, migrant, runaway, and Head Start programs

- Eligibility does not extend to other household members





Direct Certification – Medicaid

- The CDE has been selected to participate in a USDA Medicaid DC Demonstration Project
- The DC results for the Medicaid will be available statewide through CALPADS beginning SY 2017–18

Direct Certification – Medicaid

- The Medicaid project will directly certify students for free and reduced-price meals and benefits will extend to the household





Direct Certification – Medicaid

- CALPADS codes will be updated in SY 2017-18 to reflect new codes for Medicaid free and reduced-price
- Program Operators will be notified of the new codes in Winter 2017
- Program Operators should work with Point of Service vendors to ensure system compatibility



Direct Certification – Medicaid

- Children directly certified for reduced-price meals may still qualify for free meals
- CDE will update prototype notification letters of Direct Certification eligibility



Direct Certification – Spring 2017 Training

The CDE will be providing training on DC best practices in Spring of 2017

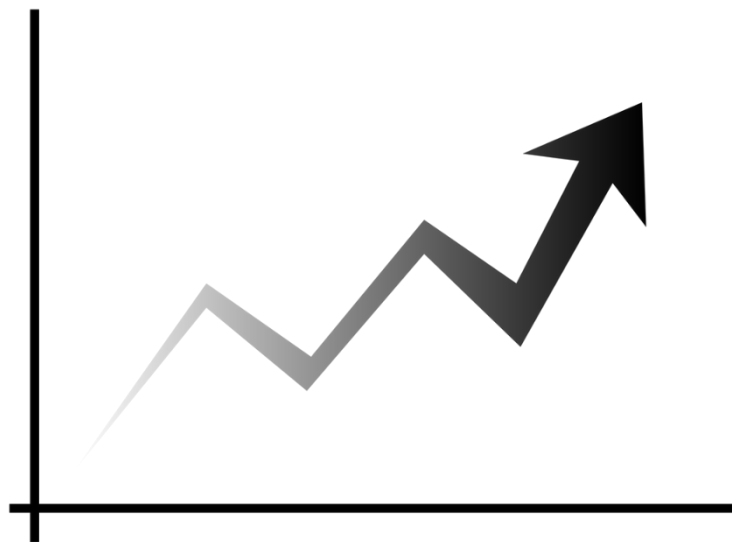

Maximize the number of Direct Certification lists you receive

- CALPADS
- County offices
- Other liaisons



Direct Certification – Increase Match Results

Invest the time into maximizing DC results now

- Ensures your neediest children are provided with meal benefits
- Could qualify schools for CEP and increase LCFF
- Saves time and resources





Direct Certification – Increase Match Results

- Perform DC monthly
- Extend benefits when possible
- Take ownership over the DC data
- Get to know your enrollment policies
- Attend CDE DC training in Spring 2017
