

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



The SNS credentialing Program was established in 1997 by SNA to enhance the professional image of school nutrition professionals, elevate professional standards and enhance individual performance. It is a mark of excellence and achievement that reflects what it takes to manage a school nutrition program in today's challenging climate. The SNS exam evaluates the candidate's knowledge and skills required to perform specific job activities related to managing or directing school nutrition programs.

## WHAT'S COOKING WITH CHEF JIM

Well it is summertime and we don't always feel like cooking, do we?

This year here in the Lakeside Union School District we have developed a new cold meal option for our elementary students that we have named Energy Packs. My previous cold option had been a yogurt/bagel combination but it wasn't working out too well as the yogurt-lovers threw the bagel away and the bagel-lovers threw the yogurt away and the trash can had as much food in it as the kids did.

My goal was to have a 2 Meat/2 Grain option that was packed together and that, hopefully, would be more appealing. After experimenting around with various bags and boxes we settled in on using a 24-oz. clear plastic container that we also use for our chef salads. Then I made a list of everything cold possible that could be either 2 Meats or 2 Grains and Chef Jim started laying them all out on the table and mixing and matching.

To save you all that work, here is what Chef Jim came up with.

- Nacho Energy Pack—1/4 c. bean dip, 1 oz. cheddar cheese cubes, 1 pkg. tortilla chips
- Yogurt Energy Pack—4 oz. container yogurt, 1 oz. sunflower kernels, 2 pkg. graham crackers
- Cheese Energy Pack—2 string cheese, ½ c. marinara sauce, 2 pkg. graham crackers
- Cottage Cheese Energy Pack—4 oz. cottage cheese, 1 pkg. apple slices, 2 pkg. graham crackers

These were so successful that a few months later we decided to expand the concept to breakfast. This time the goal was to have a 1 Meat/1 Grain option (okay, to be entirely correct it should be a 1 Meat Counting as 1 Grain/1 Grain option.) We contacted our paper supplier to get a smaller container from the company making our lunch boxes and Chef Jim began mixing and matching again.

- String Cheese Energy Pack—1 string cheese, 1 pkg. graham crackers, 1 pkg. apple slices
- Egg Energy Pack—1 hard-cooked egg, 1 pkg. graham crackers, 1 pkg. apple slices
- Cheddar Cheese Energy Pack—1 oz. cheddar cheese cubes, 1 pkg. graham crackers, 1 pkg. apple slices
- Sunbutter Energy Pack—1 pkg. sunbutter spread, 1 pkg. graham crackers, 1 pkg. apple slices
- Sunflower Energy Pack—1 pkg. sunflower kernels, 1 pkg. graham crackers, 1 pkg. apple slices

As a clever reader, you have probably clued in to the fact that on the Egg Energy Pack we only needed half an egg to meet the requirement but when we tried that the kids complained that it was too small.

You can see that you could mix up the different components different ways to make new combinations. If you have students that require a gluten-free option you can take out the graham crackers and substitute rice cakes. Finally, we developed some stickers we could do up here in the office on the color printer. They really look nice and are comparable in cost to our other entrée choices. They account for around 20% of our daily sales. All that and no need to heat up the kitchen!

# HEALTHY EATING SHOULD NOT STOP WHEN SCHOOL IS OUT FREE MEALS FOR KIDS BRIDGE THE SUMMER HUNGER GAP

In your role as the nutrition expert in your community, I know you are concerned about what summer means for the nearly 3.6 million students who depend on you for their free or reduced-cost meals at school. In 2014, nearly 2 million California children under 18 who participated in the National School Lunch Program missed out on free meals available to all kids through USDA's Summer Food Service Program.

"Having kids home for summer vacation can add as much as \$300 to a family's monthly grocery bill," said Tammy Anderson-Wise, CEO of Dairy Council of California. "When extra dollars aren't available, lack of nutritious food may set up a cycle for poor performance once school begins again and may make students more prone to illness and other health issues."

Luckily, USDA's Summer Food Service Program and the Seamless Summer Feeding Option—coordinated by the California Department of Education—that extend the National School Lunch Program, help bridge the summer hunger gap. These programs ensure all children under 18 have access to free healthy meals while school is out, but few take advantage of this opportunity.

Whether your department services a summer meals site or not, you can make sure your students know that healthy eating doesn't have to take a summer vacation. Finding a site is as easy as texting FOOD or COMIDA (for Spanish speakers) to 877-877.

We just never know what great results may come from making a congressional call!




